# Promoting Sustainability through Internationalisation at Home (laH) in Ireland



### What is Internationalisation at Home (IaH)?

The concept of 'Internationalisation at Home (IaH)', which calls for 'the purposeful integration of international and intercultural dimensions into the formal and informal curriculum for all students within domestic learning environments' (Beelen & Jones, 2015), is endorsed by global organisations such as the United Nations and the European Union.

laH seeks to provide international and intercultural learning to most students at their home institution who cannot take advantage of the mobility opportunities due to socio-economic, physical, or personal circumstances or a lack of interest or awareness about laH.

## How does laH promote **Sustainability**?

laH contributes to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals- SDG 4 on Quality Education, SDG10 on Reduced Inequalities and SDG 17 on Partnership for Goals.

### SDG 17: Partnerships for the Goals

(a) laH supports SDG 17 by establishing partnerships with international institutions, governments, and nongovernmental organisations.

(b) By working together, laH can enable sharing of best practices, resources, and expertise to enhance the quality of education and promote sustainable development between the Global North and Global South.

(c) IaH encourages a culture of entrepreneurship and innovation.

# **SDG 4: Quality Education**

(a) IaH can enhance the quality of education by providing opportunities for students to gain international experience and exposure without leaving the country.

- (b) This can be achieved through initiatives such as international student exchange programs, Collaborative online international learning/ virtual exchange programs, internationalising the curriculum, offering language programs etc.
- (c) By doing so, laH helps students to acquire a global perspective, intercultural competence, and transversal skills, which are essential for their personal and professional development.

# SDG 10: Reduced Inequalities

(a) laH can reduce inequalities by promoting equality, diversity, and inclusion in the higher education culture.

(b) IaH fosters mutual respect, understanding, and appreciation of different cultures, religions, and beliefs.

(c) laH helps improve the curriculum that infuses SDGs addressing societal challenges.

**246,299** students are enrolled in full-time third level education in Ireland (HEA, 2022)

Approximately 98% of these students do not travel abroad as part of their studies

Strong Emphasis on IaH through the curriculum in the 'Irish Educated, Globally Connected, an International Education Strategy for Ireland' (2016-20)
