

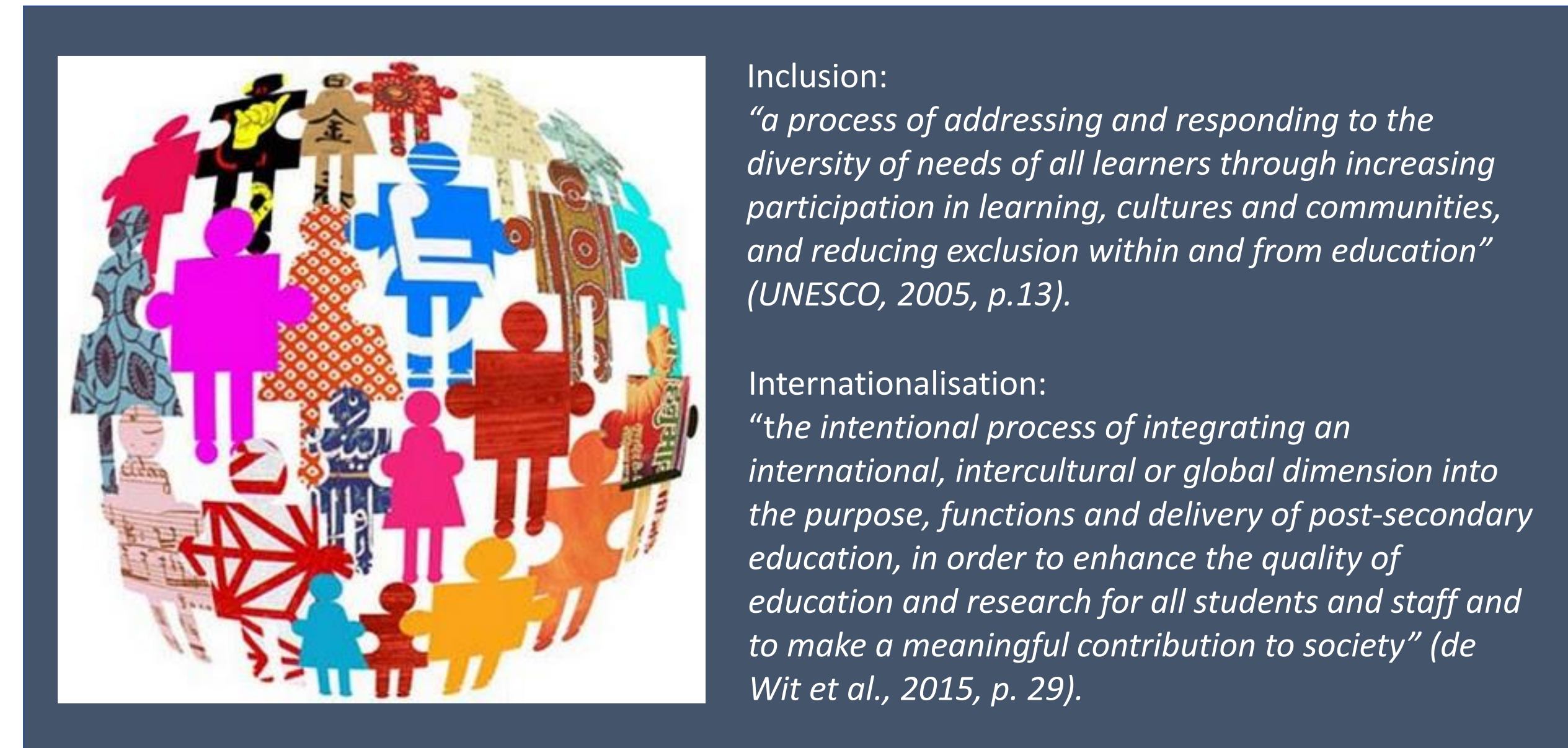
International Opportunities for All through 'Inclusive Internationalisation'

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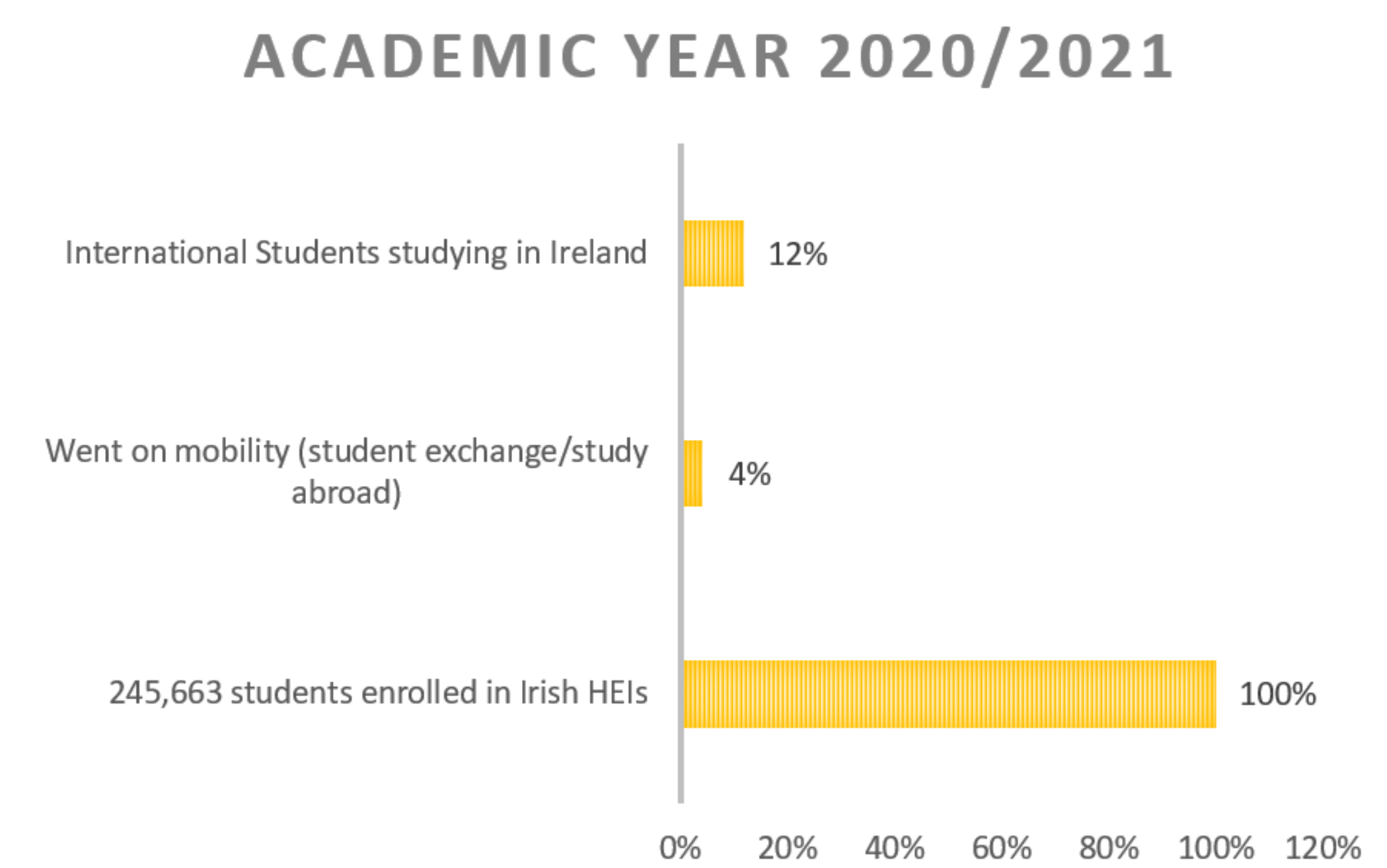
Introduction:

Making internationalisation activities more inclusive has multifaceted benefits and contributes to achieving the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals.

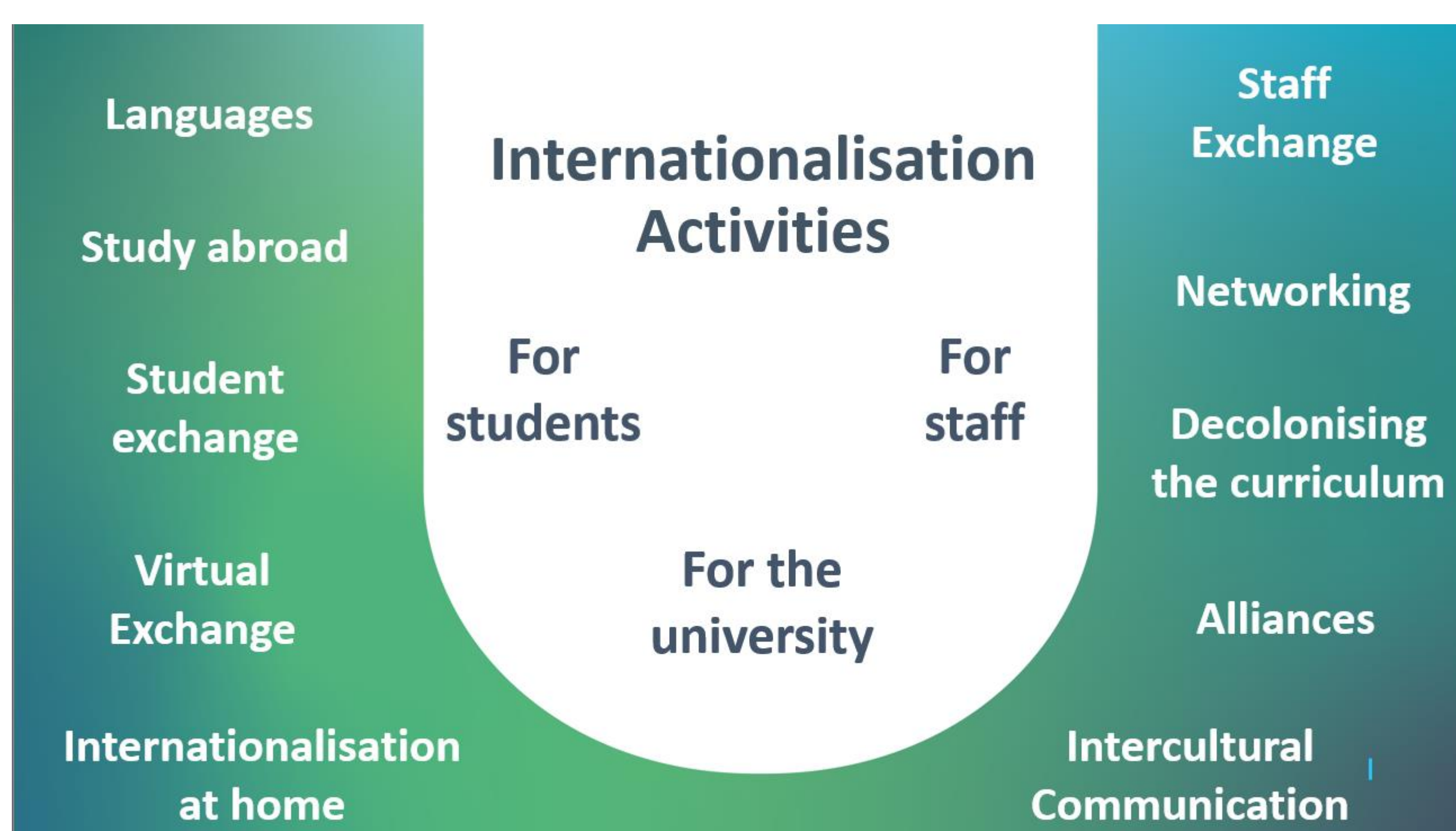


Equity in access to opportunities and inclusivity ensure a better education, preparing our graduates for employment in a globalised world and to make a positive contribution to society.

Methods

- Interviews and focus groups with academic staff and management, students, and other stakeholders
- Collation and analysis of national and university policy documents

Desired Impact

- Provide a new model for positioning 'inclusive internationalisation' at the heart of SETU
- Influence institutional and national strategy, and national policy
- Focus on inclusive approach to engaging with students and staff in relation to teaching, learning and support
